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ECONOMETRIC ANALYSIS OF MACROECONOMIC INDICATORS OF THE REPUBLIC OF KARAKALPAKSTAN

(on the example of trading)

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ABSTRACT

This article provides a correlation and regression analysis of the main economic indicators of the Republic of Karakalpakstan using Ridge regression, LASSO and least squares methods. The actual and theoretical values of the gross regional product of the Republic of Karakalpakstan were studied and the obtained statistical data were checked for the presence of a normal distribution law according to the Harke-Bar criterion.

1. Introduction

One of the urgent tasks for the comprehensive development of the Republic of Karakalpakstan includes the use of modern technologies in the field of trade, ensuring the safety of business people and their activity, liberalization of the management system of trade in a market environment [1].

The use of modern information technologies in trade enterprises is a requirement of the time. In recent years, government programs for the development of small and family businesses have been developed [2].

According to the data of the statistical office [3] of the Republic of Karakalpakstan, of the gross regional product (GRP) is agricultural production 27.3%, industrial production 39.4%, trade networks and services 33.3%. In these statistics, the average refers to the network of commerce and services. Therefore, the study and analysis of macroeconomic indicators of GRP for the development of trade and services is timely for increasing the efficiency and systematization of trade networks [4-8].

2. Least square method.

Data processing in engineering, economics, medicine and other sciences often leads to the need to determine unknown parameters of a function of the form

In practice, the most often used is a linear relative function of unknown parameters, i.e.

where $x_0 = 1$. Let us write equations (1) in matrix form

matrix of regressors, $\beta - m + 1 -$ dimensional column vector of unknown parameters; ε - a column vector of unobservable uncorrelated observation errors.

In this case, the parameters are easily calculated using the least squares method

if the matrix C = (X'X) non-degenerate. Following this, we obtain an empirical regression equation of the form

The magnitude is the theoretical value that corresponds to the regressors $x_m, m = \overline{1, n}$.

 R^2 shows the quality of the forecast, the closer the coefficient of determination is to one, the better the regression model.

3. LASSO method and Ridge regression.

Researchers are often faced with multicollinearity problems. This occurs when there is a strong correlation between the input factors. Usually, to eliminate multicollinearity, a variable is excluded from the model of one or a number of correlated variables. This exclusion of variables will require a number of economic considerations. In a number of works [9] it is proposed to use the LASSO method, which makes it possible to invalidate some variables in the model. The LASSO method is described as follows. Let a linear regression equation of the form be given:

where β – unknown parameters; - unobservable uncorrelated observation errors.

It is required to solve the minimization problem

where $\lambda > 0$ regularization parameter.

We minimize not only the sum of the squares of the residuals, but we minimize the sum of the squares of the residuals plus the penalties of audible large coefficients. Regularization parameter λ usually found using the cross-validation method [10]. The LASSO method performs regularization of the coefficients and equates some of the coefficients to zero for a sufficiently large value λ . For details on the LASSO method, see the book [11]. Ridge regression is called Ridge regression in English literature. The Ridge regression method minimizes the following expression:

 $\sum_{i=1}^n \left| \beta_i \right|^2 < f(\lambda)$. This means that for large regularization parameters, the vector

estimation norm decreases.

Application of the method of least squares for the analysis of macroeconomic indicators in R. We load macroeconomic indicators into the R math package with the following command:

The work uses the following notation for macroeconomic indicators:

YHM-gross regional product million soums

AS-Population million

SM- Industrial product million soums

QM - Agricultural product million soums

XZ-services million soums

MSS- Net tax on products million soums

AKI - Investment in fixed capital million soums

CHSA- Retail turnover mln. Soums.

CHSAA-Retail trade turnover per capita million soums

KS- Number of enterprises, thousand units

XIX- The volume of foreign investment million soums.

XIKS-Quantities of the enterprise with foreign investments units.

Let's construct a linear regression equation using the command in R:

By analyzing the data obtained with the above package R, the estimated coefficients that meet all the criteria. It turns out that among the coefficients of indicators, the coefficient at MSS is significant. The least squares method gives a good estimate, but in cases where multicollinearity is involved, the obtained estimates of the coefficients will not give good significance. To eliminate multicollinearity and obtain an adequate model, additional ones are required, such as the LASSO method and Ridge regression. Next, let's see each method separately using the R math package.

For multicollinearity analysis, the values of the increased variance of the coefficients are calculated. For this we use the VIF command from the car library of the R package.

The values VIF_j are presented in table-1, where we see that almost all these values $VIF_j > 10$ great. This means that there is multicollinearity between the resulting variables.

Application of the LASSO method for analyzing macroeconomic indicators in R.

Introduce new matrices in R and define its character as follows:

Where x01 - regressor matrix, y1 - actual GRP value.

We use glmnet command to estimate odds. This command is used to evaluate the LASSO method. Before evaluating the coefficients, we need to enter the range of variation of the regularization parameter



where the regularization parameter $\lambda \in [10^{-3}, 10^7]$.




Fig. 1. Graphical interpretation using the LASSO method Using the function cv.glmnet, you can determine the optimal value λ , which is defined as:

The relationship between the estimates of the coefficients and the values of the regularization parameter is shown in Figure-1. The relationship between the coefficients and λ shown in Figure 1: a) the horizontal direction indicates the value $\log \lambda$ and along the vertical values of the coefficients. The figure shows that if the value λ increases, then the value of the coefficients tends to zero;b) horizontally specified L1Norm values, which indicates values $\sum \beta$. If the value of the sum is in the interval (40.50), then the values of the coefficients will be around zero; c) the relationship between variance values and coefficient values is indicated here; d) the dependence of the mean square errors on $\log \lambda$.

The upper part of the figure indicates the number of non-zero β_i .

The package contains cv.glmnet (cross validation), which, based on statistical data, will make it possible to determine the corresponding value λ . We describe this function as:

Applying the Ridge Regression Method to Analyze Macroeconomic Indicators in R.

In R, enter the following commands:

The lambdas variable varies in range. G_rr stands for Ridge Regression Model. After introducing the necessary functions and commands, we received the following estimates in R.

After evaluating the coefficients, we were able to identify the regression equations of the model of the gross regional product of the Republic of Karakalpakstan.

Graphic interpretation of the three methods is shown in Figure 2.



Analysis of the information in the table shows that according to the Harke-Beer criterion, the deviation of the asymmetry coefficients and kurtosis from the confidence upper and lower values does not mean that it is not possible to analyze the law of normal distribution. It follows from this that the actual and theoretical values have the same distribution laws. With the LASSO model, the five coefficients of the above variables are turned to zero. Regularization of the parameters of these variables will make it possible to increase the number of zeroing coefficients. Using the cross-validation method, we obtained the optimal regularization parameters for estimating the coefficients.

4. Conclusion.

Research and analysis, the main macroeconomic indicators of the GRP of the Republic of Karakalpakstan (RK) allows you to obtain the following results:

- -the LASSO method allows you to determine essential variables and zeroing the coefficients of irrelevant variables (multicollinearity);
- -the LASSO method substantially approaches the actual GRP values when processing statistical data;
- the coefficient of determination has the greatest value according to the LASSO method.
- of the above macroeconomic indicators, four variables turned out to be significant: retail turnover per capita (CHSAA), net product tax (MSS), agricultural product (QM) and foreign investment (XIH), which have positive coefficients.

In general, the results of studies using OLS, Ridge and LASSO showed the possibility of using it in studying the relationship between macroeconomic indicators of trade development in the Republic of Kazakhstan. Regression analysis of macroeconomic indicators using LASSO methods confirmed its broader capabilities compared to conventional regression analysis. The results obtained with its help are quite satisfactory in their accuracy and are consistent with the statistics of trade. The results of the studies performed allow us to draw important conclusions on the effectiveness of using these methods for statistical modeling of macroeconomic indicators in trade. Using the LASSO method reduces the initial information represented by multicollinear input variables. As a result, it seems possible to proceed to modeling the processes under study using a limited set of new variables. This makes it possible to significantly simplify the procedure of economic and statistical analysis and make it more efficient. Having the ranked sequences of the influence of generalized variables, one can choose the most effective measures to improve the performance of the trade enterprise. Economic and mathematical models of labor productivity of trade and the cost of goods, obtained using the LASSO method, can be successfully used to improve the economic and statistical analysis of the activities of a trade enterprise and the Republic of Kazakhstan in general. The accuracy of the estimates for these models is quite high (the coefficient of determination ranges from 0.96-0.99; the average approximation error is at the level of 6-16%), the transition to ordinary regression equations with the entire set of initial factors does not significantly improve these estimates.

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
